

International Osteoporosis Foundation One-Minute Osteoporosis Risk Test*

Are you among the one in three women, and the one in five men around the world who will be affected by osteoporosis? Osteoporosis weakens bones and causes fractures which can result in severe disability.

Take the IOF One-Minute Risk Test and find out if you are at risk.

1) Have either of your parents been diagnosed with osteoporosis or broken a hip after a minor bump or fall?

2) Have you broken a bone after a minor bump or fall?

3) Have you taken corticosteroid tablets (cortisone, prednisone, etc) for more than 3 months?

4) Have you lost more than 3 cm (just over 1 inch) in height?

5) Do you regularly drink alcohol in excess of safe drinking limits?

6) Do you smoke more than 20 cigarettes a day?

7) Do you suffer frequently from diarrhea (caused by problems such as celiac disease or Crohn's disease)?

Did you undergo menopause before the age of 45?

Have your periods stopped for 12 months or more (other than because of pregnancy or menopause?)

----- For Men -----

Have you ever suffered from impotence, lack of libido or other symptoms related to low testosterone levels?

If you answer "yes" to any of these questions, it does not mean that you have osteoporosis, but you may be at risk. We recommend that you show this test to your doctor, who will advise whether further tests are necessary.

The good news is that osteoporosis can be diagnosed easily and treated. Find out about what changes you might make in your lifestyle to reduce your osteoporosis risk. Even if you answered "no" to all of the questions, make sure you invest in your bones by following a bone-healthy lifestyle, including adequate calcium intake and exercise.
